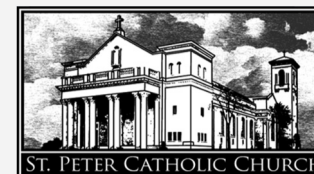

This is an ongoing summary of *Veritatis splendor*, an encyclical by Pope St. John Paul II 30 years ago. This was the first magisterial encyclical devoted entirely to issues regarding a fundamental understanding of the Church's teaching on moral theology. It is a magisterial document of the highest importance and relevance then, today, and ages to come.

Chapter Three – Moral good for the life of the Church and of the world – Morality and the renewal of social and political life (paragraph 98-99)

There is much corruption in the world – social, economic, and political. People have become indignant to this as their fundamental human rights are trampled and held in contempt. With this there is a widespread and acute sense for the need of a radical personal and social renewal which can ensure justice, solidarity, honesty, and openness. This will not be achieved quickly or easily.

Both personal experience and human history show at the bottom of these situation there are causes linked directly to how man sees himself, society, and the world. And actually, at the heart of the cause and solution is the moral sense rooted and fulfilled in the religious sense.

“Only God, the Supreme Good, constitutes the unshakable foundation and essential condition of morality, and thus of the commandments, particularly those negative commandments which always and in every case prohibit behavior and actions incompatible with the personal dignity of every man. The Supreme Good and

the moral good meet in truth: the truth of God, the Creator and Redeemer, and the truth of man, created and redeemed by him. Only upon this truth is it possible to construct a renewed society and to solve the complex and weighty problems affecting it, above all the problem of overcoming the various forms of totalitarianism, so as to make way for the authentic freedom of the person.”

All forms of totalitarianism come from a denial of an objective truth. If there is no objective, transcendent truth from which we can learn and achieve our identity, then there exists no principle or source for guaranteeing just relations among people. Instead, a self-interested class, group, or nation will set themselves up in opposition to others. If there is no transcendent truth agreed upon, then simple force of power takes over. On a personal level, each person would tend to impose himself, his interests, his opinions on others. The root of this kind of personal or national totalitarianism is in the denial of the transcendent dignity of the human person. Because each one is made in the image of God, he has by his nature rights which no one can violate.

There is an inseparable connection between truth and freedom. This is clearly seen in the Church's social teaching and in her moral teachings derived from the commandments of God. These commandments govern social, economic, and political life in a general way and also in precise and specific kinds of behavior and concrete actions.

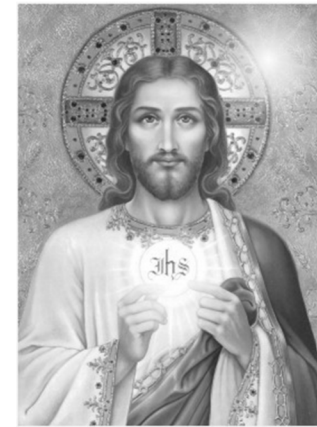
Safe Environment Training in English

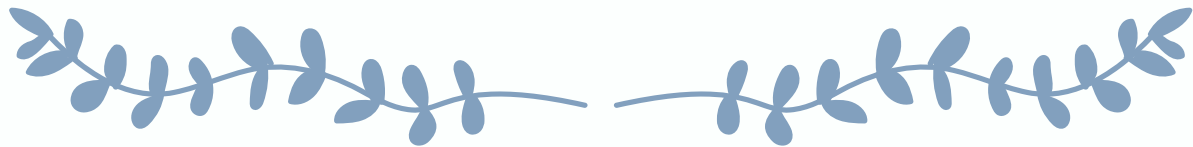
