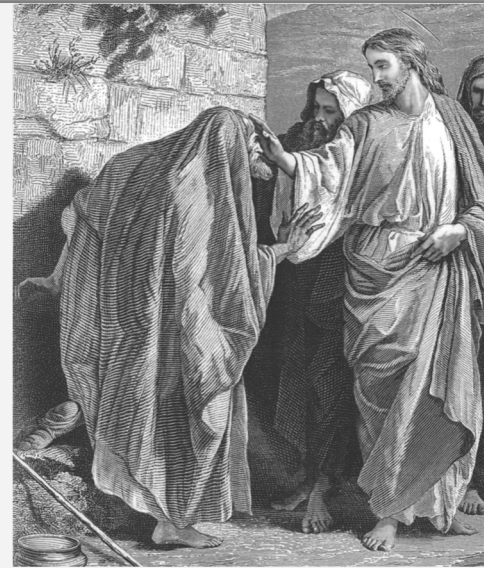

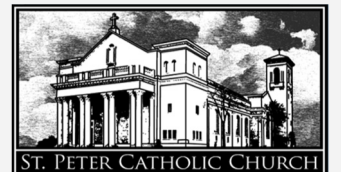

This is an ongoing summary of *Veritatis splendor*, an encyclical by Pope St. John Paul II 30 years ago. This was the first magisterial encyclical devoted entirely to issues regarding a fundamental understanding of the Church's teaching on moral theology. It is a magisterial document of the highest importance and relevance then, today, and ages to come.

Chapter Two – The moral act

“Intrinsic evil”: it is not licit to do evil that good may come of it (paragraphs 81-83)

This cannot be summarized better than it is already written: “In teaching the existence of intrinsically evil acts, the Church accepts the teaching of Sacred Scripture. The Apostle Paul emphatically states: ‘Do not be deceived: neither the immoral, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor sexual perverts, nor thieves, nor the greedy, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor robbers will inherit the Kingdom of God.’ (1 Cor 6:9-10) If acts are intrinsically evil, a good intention or particular circumstances can diminish their evil, but they cannot remove it. They remain ‘irremediably’ evil acts; per se and in themselves they are not capable of being ordered to God and to the

good of the person. ‘As for acts which are themselves sins, Saint Augustine writes, like theft, fornication, blasphemy, who would dare affirm that, by doing them for good motives, they would no longer be sins, or, what is even more absurd, that they would be sins that are justified? Consequently, circumstances or intentions can never transform an act intrinsically evil by virtue of its object into an act ‘subjectively’ good or defensible as a choice.”

The Holy Father repeats himself for clarity and emphasis that the object of an act is the source of morality and that this is in accord with Sacred Scripture, the Covenant, the Commandments, with charity, and with virtues. He rejects again the idea that intention and consequences apart from the action itself are what determine the morality of an act. Without adherence to this truth, it is impossible to affirm the existence of an objective moral order. There would be no way to establish any normal center of morality binding on all people without exception. This would do great harm to humanity and to the Church herself.

If you are an adult not receiving Communion, please do not approach the Communion rail. Children who have not received their First Communion should not kneel or stand at the Communion rail. Children are always welcome at Sacred Liturgies, however, if children become noisy and need a break, there are speakers in O'Brien Hall and the church vestibule from which the Mass may be heard.

Abstinence and Fasting in Lent

All Catholics 14 years of age and older are required to refrain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and every Friday of Lent. All Catholics aged 18 to 59 are required to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting includes one regular meal plus two small meals with no food between the meals. Dispensations or commutations from fasting for reasons of health or nursing may be given, but you must speak with Fr. Broheimer.
