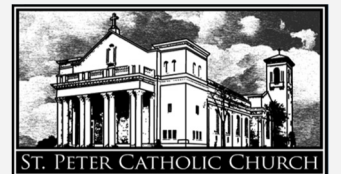

This is an ongoing summary of *Veritatis splendor*, an encyclical by Pope St. John Paul II 30 years ago. This was the first magisterial encyclical devoted entirely to issues regarding a fundamental understanding of the Church's teaching on moral theology. It is a magisterial document of the highest importance and relevance then, today, and ages to come.

Chapter Two – The moral act

“Intrinsic evil”: it is not licit to do evil that good may come of it (paragraphs 79-80)

Erroneous moral theories (e.g. consequentialism or proportionalism) hold that it is impossible to say an action is evil by the action itself – intrinsically evil – apart from consideration of the intention or the consequences. This idea is to be completely rejected because the “primary and decisive element for moral judgment is the object of the human act, which establishes whether it is capable of being ordered to the good and to the ultimate end, which is God.”

It is clearly reasonable to know that there are human actions which are by their very nature “incapable of being ordered to God.” These are called intrinsically evil acts.

There are acts which are always immoral in all circumstances and apart from the intentions of the one acting. Some examples given are the intentional killing of an innocent human being, abortion, mercy killing, adultery, etc. There are some acts which are always immoral and hence never to be freely chosen because the one willing to do them is willing to make himself to be an evildoer.

The Holy Father also makes reference to the teaching of Pope St. Paul VI regarding the intrinsically evil act of contraceptive practices whereby the conjugal act is intentionally rendered infertile. Pope Paul taught: “Though it is true that sometimes it is lawful to tolerate a lesser moral evil in order to avoid a greater evil or in order to promote a greater good, it is never lawful, even for the gravest reasons, to do evil that good may come of it — in other words, to intend directly something which of its very nature contradicts the moral order, and which must therefore be judged unworthy of man, even though the intention is to protect or promote the welfare of an individual, of a family or of society in general.”

If you are an adult not receiving Communion, please do not approach the Communion rail. Children who have not received their First Communion should not kneel or stand at the Communion rail. Children are always welcome at Sacred Liturgies, however, if children become noisy and need a break, there are speakers in O'Brien Hall and the church vestibule from which the Mass may be heard.

Friday Eucharistic Exposition is typically offered after the 8:00 am Mass until 6:00 pm. On the first Friday of the month, Exposition ends at 7:30 pm. More dedicated adorers are needed. Contact the parish office for details.
