

The object of the deliberate act (paragraphs 76-77)

"But the consideration of these consequences, and also of intentions, is not sufficient for judging the moral quality tradition... The faithful are obliged to acknowledge and of a concrete choice." Good consequences may even lessen the gravity of an evil act, but they cannot justify a morally evil action. In addition, it is impermissible to evaluate a moral act solely on consequences due to the fact it is impossible to foresee all consequences or proportions to any action; one cannot measure the

"Such theories however are not faithful to the Church's teaching when they believe they can justify, as morally good, deliberate choices of kinds of behavior contrary to These theories [consequentialism and proportionalism] cannot claim to be grounded in the Catholic moral
